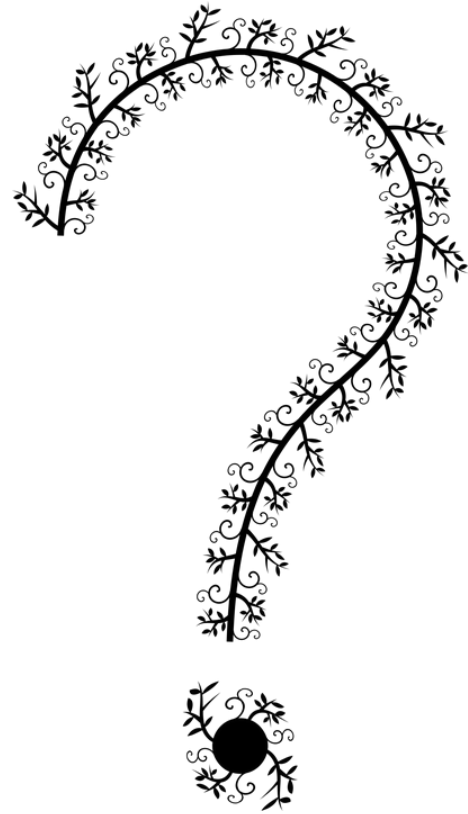

Station 1: Topic Sentences

Topic Sentences

Writing topic sentences is like the R of the RACE method...

R: Restate.

In our topic sentence, we want to RESTATE the question. To restate the question, pick the important words and include them in your answer.



For example:

1. How many dollars **should a plane ticket cost**?

Topic sentence: **A plane ticket should cost** 8 dollars.

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Station 2: Citing Text Evidence

Citing Text Evidence

Remember, when you are asked to cite text evidence, we want to see “quotation marks” and quotes directly from the text.

This is the second part of the RACE method: A.C.E.

A: Answer - C: Cite - E: Explain



For example:

1. How many dollars **should a plane ticket cost?**

Answer: A plane ticket should cost **8 dollars**.

Cite: In paragraph 8, George Washington states, **“8 dollars is the best price for a plane ticket.”**

Explain: This proves that 8 dollars is the best price because **Washington is an expert on plane ticket prices.**

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Station 3: Rhetorical Devices & Appeals Review

Rhetorical Devices & Appeals Review

Connect the Rhetorical Device to its' description & effect:

Religious Reference	Referring to an event/document from the past to align a speaker with American ideals.
Parallelism	Referring to God or religion to reflect moral ideals – “the right thing to do.”
Historical Allusion	Repeating words/phrases to help the audience remember the message.

SOAPSTone + Effect Review

Connect the Piece of a Speech to its definition:

Speaker	When & Where the speech takes place & the events leading up to the speech.
Occasion	The people that the Speech is addressed to.
Audience	The person making the Speech.
